

Back at camp we made preparations to hunt pink and blue agates, and 30 minutes later we stopped in a big agate field covered with

colorful agate. Further exploration of the area led us to a canyon of blue amygdules filled with quartz crystals. The amygdules were similar to geodes but without the rhyolite outer layer. They were unusually large and the potato sized blue nodules were filled with quartz crystals.

After that we found some coarse sagenite specimens. The rock had multicolored agate needles, but lacked sufficient agate to make it worthy of slabbing.

No, it turned out that one of our members rolled onto his remote start key fob while he was sleeping. After some coaxing, he told his car to go back to sleep, and I did the same, treating my sore body to much needed rest.

The next morning found us hunting emerald green fluorite and larger pieces of blue agate before lunch. It was easy to get to this location and the hunting was great. No one knew what was in store for the afternoon.



The road to the Top Notch mining claim is an adventure of its own, because it's

not easy to get there. Though Baxter Wash is mostly deep sand, it changes to rocky steep terrain as we climbed over small hills and traversed several drainages near the summit of

Top Notch. As we climbed each hill, we couldn't see over the

top, and it reminded me of the roller coasters I used to ride before I got middle aged vertigo. Like the roller coasters, it was quite thrilling and the ride gave everyone an adrenaline high. Once we arrived at the Top Notch claim, we could see diggings everywhere. There's lot of agate still in those hills, and we found some choice pieces as float. We also worked some seams for reddish jasper agate.

One of our last stops of the day was exploring a slot canyon in Afton Canyon---a canyon so deep that light is unable penetrate and flashlights are needed to navigate and scale the walls.





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The walls of this natural canyon are mostly sand and rock, but they are cemented together into a hard matrix by some unknown process. Being true rock hounds, we all helped shine our lights and offered advice while going up and down the canyon, but I discovered how to make rock hounds even more helpful. As we were descending a rock face. I noticed what looked like petrified wood protruding from



the wall.

"Wait is that petrified wood sticking out of the wall?" It definitely got everyone's attention as everyone immediately rushed the wall. It wasn't petrified wood, but it was instrumental in getting the last person down the wall and back into the sunlight.

By now it was getting late and we all had plenty of rock for our trip home. Weekend traffic back to the city was building and we still had to travel several miles of sand to get to the pavement. Though some elected to stay another day, most of us had to get back to LA. There's not much rock to be found in LA, so we bid a sad adieu to our new and old friends and left for rock-less LA, disappearing in a cloudy of dust on a road of endless weary sand.
