# ~A Diamond is Forever~

"A diamond in the rough," "diamonds are a girl's best friend," "a diamond is forever." The supply of diamond catchphrases is never ending, but why are diamonds so popular? Diamonds are the April birthstone and are known for their use in engagement rings or diamond encrusted jewelry. However, this was not always the case. This phrase "a diamond is forever" was part of a marketing strategy by De Beers, who started using this tagline in 1948 to increase their diamond sales after the Great Depression. The phrase was so popular that they have been using it ever since. Prior to 1948, diamond rings were not typical for engagement unless one was extremely affluent. This advertisement was so successful that De Beers was able to persuade an entire generation that diamond engagement rings were the official symbol of betrothal for all levels of wealth. In 1999, the Advertising Age crowned "a diamond is forever" as the Slogan of the Century. Who would have thought that a four word one-liner would be able to cement the diamonds position as an integral part of our society.

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A Diamond is Forever The term "a diamond is forever" refers this minerals strength and resilience. The word diamond is derived from the Greek word "adamas" which means invincible. Interestingly, the Greek word "adamas" is similar to the Latin verb "adamare" which means to love passionately.

Diamonds were popular among wealthy lovers in the 16th century because they were used in Scribbling Rings. These rings looked different from the engagement rings today because instead of setting a table faceted diamond in the scribbling ring,

the diamond was faceted with a sharp point. The scribbler would use the sharp point to scratch love messages on glass. Only wealthy people could afford to engrave glass instead of writing their love letter on a sheet of paper. Queen Elizabeth I and Mary Queen of Scots are two of the most famous scribblers. It is believed that Sir Walter Raleigh scribbled upon his queen's window "Fain would I rise but that I



fear to fall," to which Elizabeth replied "If thy heart fail thee, do not rise at all."

While the common use of diamonds has changed overtime, this gemstone has proved to be a invaluable part of our lives and the lives of people who lived centuries ago. Although originally a marketing strategy, De Beers was correct, a diamond is forever.

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# Brad's Bench Tips



DEBURRING A HOLE When you drill a hole, there's always a burr produced on the underside of the metal. We all have our ways of removing them typically by filing or sanding the



area smooth. But doing it this way will put scratches on your piece that will have to be polished off.

A quick way to remove the burr is to grab a drill that's two or three times larger than your hole. Simply twist it in the hole to cut off the burr. I usually do this twisting by hand, but if you have many holes to do, it's easier on your fingers to put the drill into a holder like a pin vice.

#### CLEANING STEEL SHOT

Steel shot in a vibratory or rotary tumbler works great to burnish and shine your finished silver pieces. But a common problem is how keep the shot clean. Carbon steel shot can get rusty if exposed to the air, and even stainless steel shot can sometimes develop a blackish coating that's hard to remove.

My solution of choice to clean the shot is Classic Coke. Just pour an ounce or two over the shot and let the tumbler run for an hour or so. A bad case might require a second cleaning. Some folks like to let the bubbles in the Coke dissipate before using it so that gas pressure doesn't build up in the tumbler barrel. I've heard that it's the phosphoric acid in Coke that does the trick. While you're waiting for the shot to clean up, just settle back and enjoy the rest of the Coke.
